Clay Ramskill's column in RCPattern.net had an article by Bryan Jones about buying used equipment that I thought newcomers might enjoy. I will quote it verbatim as much as space permits and then edit it as space demands.

"Airframes: These are the easiest items to inspect. The first and easiest to check is the covering or paint. Having a well applied and thoroughly sealed covering is important in keeping oil and other material from the underlying wood or fibreglass. Water or oil soaked structures will eventually weaken and fail. Look in the engine compartment for the sealing I have mentioned. Exposed wood is easy to spot. Another area critical to an airplane's structural integrity is the wing saddle and attachment structure. Look here for cracks or evidence of previous repairs. Generally, any joint having been repaired will be weaker than originally constructed. If the joint shows sign of repair, this means design or crash damage. Assume it is crash damage and inspect the tail feathers and other exposed inner surfaces in the fuselage.

Wings are a little more of a mystery than the fuse. Without breaking the wing, place it over your knee and apply a little pressure. Listen for cracking noises (stop then!). Look for splinters falling out of openings. Check control surface tightness and operation. Look for wing tip damage. Wing tip damage comes in two forms; first, the underside scrapes caused from ground loops and hard landings. Second, the crunching effect on the end of the wing tip caused by cart-wheeling. Cartwheeling will trash a model quicker than most anything........"

Maybe you will benefit from this information. Next month will be on engines or radio gear.....

KCRC Club Minutes

The February 12, 2002 meeting of the Knox County Radio Control Society was held at the Deane Hill Recreation Center.

President Jerel Zarestky called the meeting to order at 7:01pm. Joel Hebert gave the Treasury Report. The meeting minutes from the January meeting were passed as read. There were 31 members present.

Old Business

President Zarestky said he talked to Doug Battaille, who is with the Knox County Parks and Recreation Department, about our lease (which is due to expire at the end of June). President Zarestky said he didn't think there was going to be a problem with the lease renewal. They also talked about a potential move, and Jerel said he would have to talk to Mr. Battaille some more about that. Mr. Battaille said he wants to put us in a place that of more prominence to the park. President Zarestky wasn't sure what he meant by that, other than make it easier for people to drive by and see us, but would talk to him some more on that subject. President Zarestky sent him a diagram showing Mr. Battaille the area we need to fly in.

Mr. Battaille also notified President Zarestky of the dates of some of the Cross Country meets that will be held in the park (at KCRC). Two of the meets are being held in the middle of the week, one on a weekend in August. Jerel said we would publish the dates so everybody can be aware of them, and we will need some volunteers at the field to help police the events and the use of the field during the meets.

President Zarestky asked if anyone was interested in having a contest at our field. Dennis Hunt said there would be 9 SPA contests in the southeast, the nearest one in Chattanooga (the first part of June). There was quite a bit of interest shown by the members present in having a contest, if Chattanooga doesn't have one. A motion was made by Joe Bolinsky to have a contest at KCRC; it was seconded by Phil Spelt and passed by a unanimous vote. Dennis Hunt will be the Contest Director (CD). Sound rules are to be enforced and we will start the contest at 8am. The contest will be announced at a later date.

President Zarestky then talked about the Sound Rule. He proposed writing up a proposal, as submitted by the Committee, posting it in the newsletter for all the members to read (possibly print it in the newsletter for 2 months), generate some discussion over something that is in writing, and then vote on it. It was suggested that we put it in the March and April newsletter, and at both times announce it will be voted on at the May meeting.

NEW BUSINESS

President Zarestky brought up the subject of mowing the Club field (around the runway). Joe Bolinsky said he would ask James Schrubb, and see if he would be interested in doing it again this year. If you know of someone that is interested in mowing the field, let us know.

Jerel said he got a call from George Shacklett. He said they've been doing contests with the Society of Antique Modelers (S.A.M.) at Rockwood airport for the past 5 years. It's a R\C assist Free Flight event. The event will be held on July 15th and 16th at the Rockwood airport. The meet is sanctioned by K.C.R.C. and will be mentioned in the AMA magazine. Everyone is welcome to help out or attend the event.

]There has been some talk in the past few months about a float fly. Jerry Goss found a place off Guinn Road to hold the event. (Jerry has been flying from there for sometime, and says it's a great site.) The float fly will take place on Saturday, May 4, 2001.

There was a question if the location was far enough from the club field, and the reply was "yes."

President Zarestky asked if the Club would be interested in hosting a Flea / Fly/ Bar-B-Que this spring. After a short discussion among the members present, it was decided that the Club would host such an event on May 18th. Joe Bolinsky was asked to co-ordinate the event and to pick up the Bar-B-Que. The cost for the Bar-B-Que will be \$5 per person. The event will start at 8am, so bring some stuff to sell, a plane to fly and join in on the fun!

President Zarestky said that he had been asked many times if the Club was going to have an airshow this year, and he posed the question to the members present. The answer was mixed. Jerel said he needs a "brave individual to step up" to be the C.D. and we need a sound system. Many members expressed that they have been asked if we were going to have an airshow this year.

MODEL of the MONTH

Walt King brought out his Balsa USA Laker with a 71-½ inch wingspan and powered by a MDS .48 two stroke. A real nice looking plane, covered in yellow and blue monocote. Walt said there was some things that you would want to change if you ever built one and it wasn't the easiest thing to build.
