Revised Bylaws and Field Regulations

Ray Le Blanc is to be commended for his efforts at identifying and correcting problems that existed in the previous set of bylaws. He has spent time as a CEO of a company and is familiar with some of the problems that can arise as a result of regulations that are perhaps a little muddy in their wording or interpretation.

The club Executive Board has been working on this problem for quite some time now, and it is time to get the bylaws passed and to move on.

On the left is a poll voting form that you can use if you have not voted previously by internet or by mail. We will also have a vote at the September meeting which will be held at KCRC field. Every member is urged to cast a vote. If you do not vote, it will be assumed that your vote is a "Yea " vote for acceptance of the Bylaws and the Rules. Remember, an AMA number is required.

Minutes from August Meeting

The August 10, 2004 meeting of the Knox County Radio Control Society was held at KCRC field. The meeting was called to order by President Phil Spelt at 6:59pm and welcomed all members and guests. There were 28 members present.

Joel Hebert gave the Treasury report. The meeting minutes from the July meeting were passed as read in the newsletter. It was also reported that we received a check from Knox County Parks and Recreation for part of the shelters over the pit area.

There was a report from the By-laws Committee, which worked tirelessly on the reworking of the By-laws and Safety rules. It was reported that the new, improved rules were on the website (<u>www.rcpattern.net <http://www.rcpattern.net/></u>) for review, and for you to vote on to accept or reject as well. For those without Internet access, the updated By-laws and Safety rules are being mailed to those members, and they can vote by mail. After the By-laws are voted on, a copy will be posted at the field, and all members are requested to download a copy for their reference.

OLD BUSINESS

The first order of business was the upcoming SPA Masters Pattern Contest, which will be held at KCRC field on September 18 & 19, 2004. Dennis Hunt gave a short report and reported that there will be anywhere from 39 to 50 contestants at the contest. It was also announced that you can pre-register for the contest online until September 10, and get an additional raffle ticket. It was requested that we close down the field at 12 noon on Friday, September 17 to local flyers so the SPA members can practice. Also, he requested that some of the Club members help, if they are not flying in the contest. If you can help, please let Dennis or Ed know.....

The next order of business was the announcement of our next float fly, which will be held in the park below the field on September 25, 2005 from 9am until 3pm. The field will be closed during that time to prevent frequency conflicts. Come out and enjoy the fun!

NEW BUSINESS

The first order of business was a short report about the AMA Gold Leader Status for KCRC, and the requirements that must be met. For this Club to be a gold level leader Club, which is the top level, we need to do 3 things.... Two of which we have to do anyway. Of the 9 electives, we can adopt a school program or donate a model aviation subscription to a local school library. After a short discussion among the members present, a motion was made and seconded to donate a magazine subscription to a local school.

The next order of business was an e-mail from Don Miller, who is the President of the local EAA Chapter and they will host the Tennessee School for the Deaf at Island Home airport on September 30, 2004 at 3pm. They would like for us to come again and display our aircraft. Phil said he will be recruiting for the event.

It was announced that there was a request from Knox County Parks and Recreation that we shut down the field so the Marines could use the field for one of their events. The field will be closed on Saturday, August 14 and Saturday, August 21, 2004 from 9am until 4pm. The field will be open after 4pm on those days. A sign will be posted at the field notifying all members of the closure. The next order of business was a request by the field Safety officer to look into the possibility of repairing and modifying the bleachers on either side of the main shed. One of the members said that if it cost too much to repair them, then maybe we ought to get rid of them, as most spectators don't use them anyway. A motion was made to remove the bleachers, seconded and voted on by the members present. It was voted that we dismantle the bleachers.

Dennis Hunt had a short announcement about the AMA show team flying model aircraft, and full sized aircraft being flown during an air show that was to be held in West Virginia on the 14th of August. He said that the AMA show teams were superb flyers.

The next order of business was an announcement by Scott Anderson that he wanted to schedule the next AMA Pattern meet for next year, hopefully on May 28 and 29, 2005. He hopes to get the sanction in for next year. A motion was made to have the AMA Pattern contest on May 28 / 29, 2005, and the motion was seconded and passed.

It was mentioned that there was some talk about putting a plaque on the newly erected shelters over the pit area and dedicating them to Ben Oliver, or to dedicate a section to a different member of the Club who had passed on. A suggestion was made that we put a plaque up dedicating the shelters in memoriam of all our lost members. A motion was made, seconded and passed by the members present.

There was one entry for model of the month. Jim Scarbrough showed off a Great Planes Ryan STA ARF, all done up in military colors of silver and yellow. 
PROPWASH


Do we have a new source of R/C radio interference? Some of you may have heard about the proposal to provide broadband internet service to homes and businesses over the existing power lines, with the resulting potential for radio interference problems. This will be a multi-part column to explain Broadband over Power Line (BPL) and why it will or will not be a problem for us.

The Federal Communications Comm. (FCC, who has ultimate control over the airwaves that we use) is in discussion with the Amateur Radio Relay League (ARRL), representing the amateur radio people, over potential problems stemming from BPL. We will look at what BPL is, then at the potential for problems, and finally at whether these problems will affect our radio control systems. The ultimate news is good - I don't think we will have problems. So, if that's all you want to know, you can quit reading now!

OK, what is the BPL stuff, anyhow? In simple terms, it is the imposition of a digital signal "on top of" the "analog" signal of 60-cycle AC current. AC current consists of a sine wave that repeats 60 times per second - diagrammatically it looks like this:



BPL then adds a digital signal on the same wires to this power



"signal", creating a picture like this:

Although nowhere near scale, the drawing above illustrates that two different signals can be sent over the same line, and later separated for proper use at the destination. While the AC "signal" is at 60 cycles per second (Herz), the BPL signal will be in the Megaherz (MHz) range, or millions of cycles per second (we transmit R/C at 72 MHz). In the communications world, this technique of sending two "signals" over the same piece of copper is known as Frequency Division Multiple Access, or FDMA. Many cell phones use Code Division Multiple Access (CDMA) to permit multiple conversations over the same "air wave". BPL is a problem for radio people because any time you transmit a signal, you create extra, spurious frequencies, and the higher the transmission frequency, the more powerful, in general, they are. The ARRL people and R/Cers are concerned about interference with their communications for the same reasons we are concerned about other forms of radio interference at our field. With these signals going over all power lines, the spurious signals might interfere with our R/C link. But, not to worry (probably), as you will see next time.
