The meeting for May will be on Tuesday, May 9th, 2006, at KCRC field on Williams Road at 7:00 PM.

OLD BUSINESS

There has been no work done on the electrical work planned for putting outlets on the roof supports in the pit area. Vice President Gary Lindner has acquired some wire for placing underground to bring the power from our switchboard to the pit area, but the engineering and ditching has not been done.

There has been no further work to report on the float fly.

There was no action to report on the repair to the gate at the north end of the field.

Dennis Hunt gave a report on the upcoming Ben Oliver Memorial SPA Pattern contest. Dennis has not been getting much in the way of volunteers to assist in the big event. Jim Scarbrough, who normally works at the registration, will not be available this year. He said that he had contacted by email a couple of the members who normally work with him and asked them to help out. (Ed note: Hal Travis has said that he will be glad to help out.) At any rate, Dennis says he needs more help. This event is one of the biggest contests in the SPA calendar and brings a lot of credit to the club. President Phil says he will do some campaigning by email among the membership.

There was nothing new to report on the AMA Pattern contest scheduled for August. Phil said that he and CD Scott Anderson were doing some background work, but that the contest itself was on the backburner until after the May SPA event.

NEW BUSINESS

The only new business at this time was by Ed Hartley who says that the computer that we normally use for the score keeping duties at our events needs a new home. It is kept in boxes and he would like to use the room the boxes now occupy in his home

The only other item mentioned was that the May meeting will return to KCRC field. I hope that we get a

bigger turnout than we've had the last two meetings.

MODEL OF THE MONTH

There were two entries in this months contest. The first was Bud Weisser. Bud always manages to entertain with his entries. This time he had a flying wing called the "Lightning Dart "by RichModels. It loked like an over sized Zagi except it was built up instead of foam. It was powered by an OS .40 in pusher mode and looked very fast. Bud said it hadn't been flown yet because he wasn't sure about where the CG should be.

The second entry was by Mike Gross who entered his Me-109. It was built from a Jemco kit he had gotten from Craig Dieter. Mike said the kit gave him a bunch of balsa and the instructions said to cut away everything that wasn't Me-109. It had foam wing cores that Mike planked with balsa. He fiberglassed and painted the model as a training tool to learn how to do it. Powered by a .46 two stroke, he said it required being alert while flying and you couldn't slow it down very much when landing. A good looking model.

Mike won the fuel.

Safety Officer Bill Walters demonstrated his new E Flyte helicopter, the Blade CK Coaxial Heli. This is an impressive offering from Horizon Hobbies. It is a complete unit with everything needed to begin helicopter flying. Bill flew it in the lobby of the building while we were waiting for the meeting to start, and he flew it again outside after the meeting. He says that anyone could fly this one.

CRASH OF THE MONTH

The only entry to this one was Donny Dishner, who had loaned his P-51 to his son who had taken it to the field in one piece and brought it back home in several. Donny had not been present when the deed was done, but he said the ramifications would be far reaching!

Donny got the glue.

This'n That

It's that time of year again when we start the field maintenance and begin having the events that puts a little money in the coffers. Some members think the events are a pain and we shouldn't ask them to give up the field while they are going on. Others think they are a necessary part of a modelers life, and that because of them, the whole modeling community benefits, and we should have more of them. Somewhere between these two extremes is where I think we should be. The guys who take part in the contests are the winners, both from the standpoint of actually competing, which can be a barrel of fun, and working in some function of the event where you get an inside look at a part of the hobby where you might find what you're looking for. You are also performing a service for the club, which depends on you for contributing in some manner to club maintenance.

KCRC is in the process of scheduling work days to perform some needed field maintenance. Some paint needs to be put on some wood surfaces to keep water out, and we are trying to get the pit area electrified. So if someone asks you to help, please do. Actually, you shouldn't need to be asked; remember those famous words of somebody or other; "Ask not what your club can do for you, ask instead, what can you do for your club ". Or something on that order...

Balancing Large Models Made Easy by Jeff Prosise

Next to setting up the radio properly, setting the center of gravity (C.G.) to the manufacturer's recommended location is probably THE most critical aspect of preparing a new plane for its maiden flight. Never underestimate the importance of C.G; an inch or two can make the difference between a plane that flies well and a plane that flies once.

Balancing small models is easy. You can balance the plane on your fingertips, or you can use a balancing tool like Great Planes' C.G. machine. But the Great Planes device doesn't work very well with large models, and even with a buddy to help, it's too easy for a large model to slip and go crashing to the ground when you attempt to balance it with your fingers. Here's an inexpensive solution for balancing large models. Get a piece of scrap 2-by-4 about 4 feet long and cut it into two 1-foot sections and two 8-inch sections. Screw the 8-inch pieces onto the 1-foot pieces so that they form tees. If you'd like, cut the corners off the top of the tees to provide added

clearance. Then cut two pieces of wooden dowel the same width as the tees and glue them on top, as shown below.



You now have two halves of a stand that you can place an airplane on for balancing. Mark the recommended C.G. on the wings and place the model on the stand so that the centerline of the dowels lines up with the marks (see below). Place a box, foam, or other padding material under the nose and tail of the model so it can't tip too far and possibly damage the structure. (I also place a bit of foam rubber on the dowels to avoid scratching the wings.) Then add lead to the nose or tail or move components inside the plane until it balances on the dowels. There's no risk that you'll drop the plane while balancing it, and the dowels provide the precision you need to get the C.G. exactly where you want it......Jeff

(Ed. note: If you take another piece of wood and run it across between the two units and fasten them together, it will stabilise the unit so it won't tip over.)
