Lots of water access from docks and we will have a retriever boat for wounded ducks or dead engines. Phil mentioned that preliminary talks indicate that this could develop into an annual event which could be a real bonus in terms of scheduling.
- Phil also reminded those few present that the Marines Mud Run is scheduled for this coming weekend and that the field will be closed on Saturday morning. Phil will open the gate for them Saturday morn.

- Ed Hartley mentioned that new officers will be nominated at the November meeting. This means that there will have to be a positive response at the October meeting. **THE MARINE RESERVES'  
5TH ANNUAL MUD RUN  
PHIL SPELT**

On the second Saturday in September, Delta Company of the 4th Combat Engineers, U. S. Marine Reserve Unit in Knoxville, with great help from the Marine Corps League of Knoxville, conducted their annual Mud Run. This is an event in which participants traverse a 3-mile course that now includes 3 mud pits through which they must "run".

The Marines use the bottom-most part of our flying field where the pits are dug. The fields around the runway and pit area are used for parking (see photo 1). There are also walls over which the runners must climb, and other obstacles typical of a Marine infiltration course used in basic training. All in all, it is a very taxing morning for the runners.

The initial Mud Run garnered about 200 runners. Over the next 4 years, the number climbed to over 1200 people. Some of them are shown registering in photo 2. As you can see from the photo, the Marine Corps League uses our pit shelter for registration - a perk that is helpful in case of rain. They also make use of the pavilion for storage and for extra equipment for the run.

The event is a fund-raiser for the Marines, but due to a change in the rules by which military units are permitted to participate in events like this, their horizon has expanded. As you can see in photo 2, the event also is used to collect toys in the Toys for Tots program, something the Marines have been doing each season for a number of years. The bins shown in the photo were filled to overflowing, and 3 or 4 more boxes were added.

Photo 1 shows the parking in the field below the Club parking area, and there were easily as many cars parked out beyond the runway and along our hedgerow by Williams Bend Road.
