The estimated cost for Aaron to do the repairs is \$8,500. Dennis Drone and Phil are to meet with Marine Corps League and Knox County Parks representatives Wed. Sept. 15 on repairs.

Dennis Drone reviewed some Lessons Learned from the Mud Run while they were fresh on his mind – more members needed to look after our interests (crowd control), trash bags, padlocks, etc.

#### SEPTEMBER FLOAT FLY

Saturday, September 25<sup>th</sup> dawned gray and rainy. When we arrived at the Oak Ridge Marina, the rain had stopped, but the Clinch River was covered in



fog about 2 meters deep. However, as the first 45 minutes passed, the fog disappeared and seven pilots were ready to commit aviation off the water. With gray skies hovering over us all morning, the winds were very light, making takeoff and landing a "breeze" – any direction being entirely acceptable. With little boat traffic all morning, we were free to fly as we wished.

The usual KCRCers were there, joined by Tom Aldridge from the Crossville club with his giant Short Sunderland flying boat, and Jason Russell of the House Mountain Club, with an electric Cub and a similarly powered giant Seamaster. John Walkling of the Tennessee Eagles kindly provided the retrieval boat, which was called on 4 times for "sea rescue". Steve Bayless was there with his beautiful R/C electric destroyer, which he ran only once all morning. All the pilots got in at least 2 flights, except for the Short Sunderland, which only went airborne once.



KCRC is now firmly established with the Oak Ridge Recreation and Parks Department, and we will be welcome to fly there each fall. Hopefully, in years to come, we can build this event into a larger event. If numbers grow, it could become a 2-day event, with



help from KCRC to put on the event. In the future, we would need to provide food on site, and get more publicity out to surrounding clubs well in advance. All in all, the event was a success, although the turnout was disappointingly small. Maybe next year...
