Did You Know?

The J-3 Piper Cub is one of America's most venerable aircraft. From 1937 to 1947, almost 20,000 J-3 Cubs were produced. Of those, about 5,500 are still airworthy. The Cub is distinguished by its simple, lightweight design, great low-speed handling properties, and short-field performance.

A military version of the Cub called the L-4 and nicknamed the "Grasshopper" saw action in all theaters of WWII as well as in the Korean War. Its duties included directing artillery fire, pilot training, and glider pilot instruction. It also served as a front-line liaison and was used to evacuate injured soldiers from the battlefield.
